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# **Course Objectives**

Music is central to human existence. This course is an introduction to the art and craft of music. Students will listen to and learn about many different kinds of music. No formal music training is required. Many different types of music will be covered, but the primary focus will be western art music. Students will learn about the elements that make up music, as well as the most common musical instruments.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Explain basic elements of music
- 2. Identify the major periods of music
- 3. Summarize how each element is used in each period of music

### Methodology

- 1) You are responsible for reading the assigned text BEFORE you listen to the lecture.
- 2) Set aside time for listening to the examples from the reading. These are included on Moodle under *Musical Selections*. Chapter tests WILL include a listening component, in which you will be asked to identify specific pieces. The more you listen, the more easily you will identify the piece.

### **Required Music Events**

Because this is a class to help you gain an appreciation of various styles of music, you are required to attend live performances of musical events. Check your local paper, bulletin boards etc. The onus is on the student to seek out experiences to attend. The events cannot be rock/popular bands! It must be an event that is classical/orchestral/choral in nature. There may be a fee for these concerts so plan accordingly. Most communities offer Summer Parks' concert series so that is a good place to begin. Musical Theatre or Opera will also be acceptable. If you are in doubt about the appropriateness of an event, email me in advance to check. This will form a significant portion of your grade. After attending each event, you will be required to submit a reaction paper about the performance, to which the program must be uploaded. An uploaded photo of the program will suffice. If it is an outdoor concert with no program, please send me a short video of a part of the program. Papers are due one week after the event. NO LATE PAPERS WILL BE ACCEPTED. Rubrics for the papers can be found on Moodle.

### **Grading**
