# **College Writing I**

## **Course Description**

While learning strategies that promote critical, creative, and collaborative drafting, students practice college level writing in narrative, critical, and persuasive forms, producing a portfolio of essays, including a research paper.

This course is required for graduation.

- 6. Demonstrate an improved command of written English. [see Course Objective 5]

## **Course Requirements and Evaluations**

## I. Reading Assignments

Students are expected to complete each reading assignment in advance of its presentation in class.

#### II. Quizzes

In order to encourage the completion of each reading assignment in advance of its presentation in class, students will be assessed through an ongoing series of short quizzes. While the quizzes will not account for a particular percentage of the student's final course grade, unsatisfactory performance on the quizzes will result in a lowering of what would otherwise have been the student's final course grade.

### **III. Writing Assignments**

**A.** Each student will write a series of short papers, along with revisions of short papers. All papers are graded on meeting the due dates announced in class; other graded requirements will vary from paper to paper, and will be announced in class. [a measurement of Student Learning Outcomes 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6]

**B.** Each student will write a research paper, utilizing research techniques specified in class.

The research paper is graded on content, clarity (which includes grammar, mechanics, spelling, and the like), insightfulness, thoroughness (which includes length), and meeting the due date. The research paper must be typed and double-spaced, and it must follow MLA format, including a Works Cited page at the end of the paper. [a measurement of Student Learning Outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6]

#### **IV. Memorization Quizzes**

Content and dates of initial memorization quizzes will be announced in class. *Subsequent memorization quizzes on identical content will <u>not</u> be announced in advance. [a measurement of Student Learning Outcome 4]* 

#### V Exercises

Graded exercises will be assigned, as needed, based on an ongoing assessment of class needs.

#### VI. Attendance and Participation

Attendance in this course is required, as is participation. Students should note that even excused absences prevent participation. Students who do not satisfactorily participate in class on a voluntary basis as a result of not being in class should expect to receive a lowered final course grade. Students who cannot attend class as scheduled are advised to enroll in this course in a semester when full participation is achievable.

Students who miss class for any reason are required to contact the professor by e-mail on the same day as the missed class meeting. The nature of the absence must be provided. The professor will reply to all such messages, as proof of receipt.
